## Key statistics

### Clean Heat Grant

- £100 million funding to run from 2022 until 2024
- Designed to help increase deployment of low-carbon heating technologies
- Offers upfront capital grants to enable the installation of heat pumps and, in limited circumstances, biomass boilers

### The Warm Home Discount

- Over £3 billion fund from 2011 to 2021
- For the 2020/21 scheme year there will be £351 million worth of support available
- Helps over 2 million low income and vulnerable households each winter with their energy costs
- The Scheme is being expanded from 2022 to provide help to around 3 million households across Britain

## Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme

- Provides grants for public sector bodies to fund heat decarbonisation and energy efficiency measures (such as heat pumps, solar panels, and more)
- Phase 1: £1 billion in grants as part of the Chancellor's 'Plan for Jobs 2020' commitment to support the UK's economic recovery from COVID-19
- Phase 2: £75 million of grant funding for the financial year 2021 to 2022

## Home Upgrade Grant

- £150m funding to start from 2022
- Helps low-income households in the worst-performing off-gas-grid homes in England become more energy efficient and cheaper to heat with low-carbon energy

## National Skills Fund

- £2.5 billion funding launched in 2021
- Aims to help adults train and gain the valuable skills they need to improve their job prospects and support the economy
- Estimated to support hundreds of thousands of green jobs over the next decade

## Energy Company Obligation (ECO4)

- £1 billion per year funding to start from 2022 until 2026
- Aims to help reduce carbon emissions and tackle fuel poverty
- Cavity wall insulation and gas boiler replacement
- It covers insulation measures, heating measures and connections to district heating systems (new and upgrades)
